Judge Parsons ends term as chief judge

Judge William A. Parsons' two-year term as chief judge ended June 30. During his term, Judge Parsons led the circuit through a time of substantial growth. Not only has the judiciary grown, so has the circuit's programs and services and use of technology. The Circuit has also worked to improve and/or replace court facilities to accommodate this growth and to better serve residents in Flagler, Putnam, St. Johns and Volusia counties.

Judiciary

Since July 1, 2005, the circuit has received four new judgeships. Circuit Judges Raul A. Zambrano and Randall H. Rowe, III, were appointed by the governor and were assigned to Bunnell and Daytona Beach, respectively. Circuit Judge Clyde E. Wolfe was elected to a newly created judgeship based in St. Augustine. The governor also appointed Volusia County Court Judge Peter A.D. McGlashan, who now serves in a new criminal division in Daytona Beach.

Programs/Services

Several court programs were expanded or initiated during

Judge Parsons' term. Families with multiple legal issues are now able to reduce the number of court visits as part of the Unified Family Court project in DeLand. The Court is now able to serve Southeast Volusia residents in the family court system in a new division in New Smyrna Beach. Additional family law divisions were also created in Bunnell and St. Augustine. In addition to family court services, the Circuit expanded its adult drug court program to Flagler County in late 2006. To help the public know more about these programs and court information, the Circuit established a Court Communications office to improve media and community relations. Outreach efforts have included a Law School for Journalists and an annual Afternoon at the Courthouse program with the Volusia County Bar Association.

Technology

As one of the early users of digital court reporting, Judge Parsons praised the effectiveness of the PC-based CourtSmart system and paved the way for its expansion that now includes 40 courtrooms and hearing

rooms throughout the circuit. Technology is also being used to provide better information to judges through the statewide Judicial Inquiry System, while personnel in Volusia County continue to revamp the local Criminal Justice Information System.

Facilities

Working with Flagler County Government, the circuit will welcome the state-of-the-art Kim C. Hammond Justice Center in Bunnell this fall. Plans are currently underway to expand the St. Johns County Courthouse to accommodate continued growth in that county. Meanwhile, the Circuit is also in the midst of evaluating all of its court

Judge Walsh to lead circuit as chief judge

Circuit Judge J. David Walsh will lead the Seventh Judicial Circuit as chief judge beginning July 1.

Elected by the circuit and county court judges in Flagler, Putnam, St. Johns and Volusia counties, Walsh will have administrative supervision over all courts in the circuit during his two-year term.

He will also continue his duties on the circuit bench, where he currently hears felony criminal cases. Walsh succeeds Circuit Judge William A. Parsons whose term as chief judge ends June 30.

Walsh earned his juris doctor

degree from Wake Forest University. After spending nearly 25 years in private practice as a civil trial attorney, he was appointed to the bench in 2001.

“Judge Parsons has led the circuit through a time of continued growth and technological advancement, and we appreciate his commitment to the fair and efficient administration of justice,” Walsh said.

“I am honored to have the opportunity to serve the circuit as chief judge and look forward to building on the work of Judge Parsons and other chief judges before him.”

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Judicial Profile: Circuit Judge Hubert L. Grimes

Part of a series of judicial profiles from around the Circuit.

Q: *What was your legal background before coming to the bench, and when did you become a judge?*

A: I attended Kentucky State University and got my law degree from the University of Georgia. Before becoming a judge, I was in private practice and worked for Central Florida Development Corp. and Central Florida Legal Services. I was elected as a county judge in 1988 and appointed to the circuit bench in 1999. As a family judge, I preside over juvenile delinquency, juvenile dependency and the dependency drug court. I'm also assigned to the unified family court in West Volusia. In these divisions, I feel like I can make a difference in the lives of young people and the families I deal with. As long as I can continue to make an impact, I will stay the course.

Q: *Why did you want to become a judge?*

A: I wanted to become a judge to help people. Public service and community service have been something I've been doing pretty much most of my life. Coming to the bench was a natural progression.

Q: *Who inspired you to be so devoted to public service, community service?*

A: My mother. I used to follow behind her. She was active in our church and community groups and always wanted to

help people. While my schedule these days doesn't allow me to be as involved, I enjoy helping others when I can.

Q: *What's the most rewarding part of your job?*

A: The satisfaction of making a positive difference in the lives of people, particularly the youth.

Q: *How do you deal with the emotional stress of the dependency division—having presided over it for more than seven years now?*

A: I approach my job from a very grounded life that is balanced with a spiritual foundation of prayer, a loving home environment and a family background that taught me to be "non-judgmental" of people. I do my best to judge the facts, not the people, and at the end of the day, I take off my judicial robe and live my life as a husband, father, brother, friend, etc. This approach keeps me grounded and better able to deal with the viscidities and emotions that are a daily part of life in the dependency division.

Q: *Are you noticing any trends in the juvenile delinquency division, and what can be done to prevent this activity?*

A: The number of female defendants is increasing. We are also seeing younger and younger children involved in

delinquent acts. Another problem that some do not wish to acknowledge is the presence of gangs in our county. Each of us has a role to play in dealing with our youth. Parents must learn to establish boundaries for their children from the time they are babies. We must know where our children are at all times and who they are hanging out with. We must provide positive activities for our children and not allow them to laze around watching television all day and night. My grandmother used to tell me that "an idle mind is a playground for the devil." Each of us must do whatever we can to help influence the next generation in a positive manner.

Q: *What sort of professional and personal activities are you involved in?*

A: In addition to my duties locally, I also serve on the Florida Supreme Court Family Court Steering Committee and Judicial Management Council. I teach at judicial conferences, serve as president of the Latimer-Hawkins Florida Chapter National Bar Judicial Council and participate in other community activities. Personally, I enjoy speaking, reading, writing, travel and walking. I'm also an active member of Calvary Christian Center in Ormond Beach.

Courthouse improvements continue circuitwide

The Circuit continuously monitors its facilities to ensure that they meet the needs of judges, staff and the public who use them daily.

Work on the new Kim C. Hammond Justice Center (Flagler County

Courthouse) is nearing completion. Current plans call for occupants of the existing courthouse to move to the new building the first week of September and for the facility to be operational on Sept. 10, 2007.

New carpet was installed in courtrooms 1, 2 and 8 of the Volusia Courthouse Annex at City Island in Daytona Beach. Due to a manufacturer's defect, the tile in the public corridors on the second and third floors was replaced again.

The project to replace the fire sprinkler system

at the Volusia County Courthouse in DeLand continues. Project completion is expected by the end of the year.

The Circuit continues to conduct accessibility surveys of all of its court facilities. Under the direction of Chief Justice R. Fred Lewis, all Florida courts are looking to develop practical ways to increase compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990.

Thanks to County Facilities Services staffs for assisting with these improvements.

Around the Courthouse: Mediation Services

Part of the “Around the Courthouse” series of departmental profiles from around the Circuit.

Families in conflict sometimes need intervention from an unbiased third party to figure out what they’re really fighting about. Because judges aren’t usually in a position to help parties sort through these problems, Court Administration employs two family court mediators who try to help parties reach amicable resolutions to their disputes.

Mediator Suzanne Ronneau conducts mediations in Daytona Beach, DeLand and New Smyrna Beach. Mediator Bill Dollar holds mediations in St. Augustine, Bunnell and Palatka. Sessions are either free or low cost, depending on the family’s annual income.

“Mediation is essentially communication toward finding common ground on the issues pending before the Court,” said Ronneau, an attorney who has worked for Court Administration for more than three years. “In most family law cases, the parties have become unable to communicate without blaming, labeling, undercutting, humiliating or shouting down the other party. Take out these communication dysfunctions, and they may not have many real disagreements.”

Both Ronneau and Dollar said some people have trouble understanding that a mediator is not a decision maker.

“The parties are the decision makers, and most of the time

mediation is the last chance to settle a case before it is presented to the judge,” Dollar said. “Mediators have no authority to make a decision involving a case referred for mediation. We work with both sides to hopefully reach an agreement the parties can feel good about – not love – but feel good about.”

Mediation is an informal process that is non-threatening by design, he said. Going to mediation is also less expensive than paying for attorney representation in court. Solutions can also be more flexible because the parties may come up with an arrangement unique to their case that a judge may not be able to consider because of rules and statutes.

“Many people expect the mediator to ‘set the other party straight’ – convince them they are wrong, or they must do this or that. They are determined to prove their case to me. I tell them it doesn’t matter what I think and that mediation is only about the two of them agreeing on something,” Ronneau said.

Circuit Judge Shawn L. Briese says mediation can be especially effective when children are involved in a dispute. Mediation gets the parties talking and allows them to put the best interest of the child first.

“It (Mediation) is a better method to resolve those interpersonal disputes,” said

Briese, who chairs the Florida Supreme Court’s Alternative Dispute Resolution Rules and Policy Committee. “It lets the parties have a say in what the outcome of the case is.”

Mediation also teaches parties communication methods that can be used in resolving future disputes, he said. Successful mediation helps reduce judges’ case loads and also lessens the need for post-judgment litigation.

Some civil cases in county court are referred to Volusia County Mediation Services. Volusia County Mediation Services is a private, non-profit agency that provides mediation services to residents in the Seventh Circuit. The Court contracts with VCMS to provide mediation services in small claims and other county court civil matters.

Jail Populations

The Court has continued to work with the counties of the circuit to address issues related to jail populations. Plans to expand the Putnam County Jail are ongoing, and Flagler County has established a public safety coordinating council to address

issues there. Efforts to renovate portions of the St. Johns County Jail are underway. In Volusia County, a procedure was developed to help reduce the amount of time alleged probation violators spend in jail by expediting review of these matters by felony division judges.
